FROM THE DIRECTOR

FINGER LAKES

As we close out 2024, here are some final items for you:

FLLS Reports – Two important Finger Lakes Library System documents are now available on our website. Our FLLS *Annual Report to the Community for 2023* and *2024 Annual Meeting Summary* are available here: https://www.flls.org/about-us/. Filled with member library statistics and highlights of system activities over the past two years, please make sure to take a look at both documents.



8 of our member libraries ended up being in the path of total eclipse during the April 8 North American Solar Eclipse, but all of our libraries and communities joined in the nation-wide excitement. FLLS and our member libraries ended up distributing over 9,000 pairs of eclipse glasses and hosted several fun and educational programs on that day.

The summer of 2024 saw our first ever *FLX Road Trip*, which was a promotional event that encouraged people to visit all 33 of our member libraries. We offered free road trip maps, and during library visit our member libraries stamped these maps to track participants' adventures.

On another outreach note, 14 of our member libraries received \$15,035 in 2024-2025 Outreach Mini-Grants through the FLLS Coordinated Outreach Services Advisory Council (COSAC). The Outreach Mini-Grants help our members provide library services and resources to underserved groups in the FLLS service area; specific populations can be found at the top of the Outreach webpage: www.flls.org/outreach.

FLLS Holiday Closures – FLLS will be open on Monday, December 23 and Friday, December 27, but with limited staff available. Both North and South deliveries will take place on those two days, so everyone will receive two deliveries next week. FLLS will be closed December 24 – December 26, and no deliveries will take place those days.

FLLS will be open regular hours on Monday, December 30 and 31, and our delivery schedule will remain unchanged for those days. North Route will get their delivery on the 30th and South Route on the 31st. FLLS will be closed on Wednesday, January 1 and no delivery will take place. We re-open on Thursday, January 2.

A very large thank you to Tom, Ken, and substitute driver Rex, for working during the holiday time so that our members can continue to have deliveries.

I wish all of our library staff, directors and trustees a safe and joyous holiday time. Please know that all of us at FLLS look forward to helping you in 2025 and beyond. I will be in the office over the remainder of 2024 if you need assistance while many of our staff take some time off.

POLARIS TIP

Patron Privacy/Safety in Polaris

Patron Records include personal identification information about the patron; their name, barcode, address, phone number, expiration date, email address, password and statistical information.

<u>WARNING:</u> It is important to realize that there is sensitive information in both Patron Registration and Patron Status. <u>DO NOT</u> give this information out to anyone other than the patron unless you have their explicit written permission (excludes situations with parent/guardians and children).

If a member of law enforcement requests any information regarding a patron's records, they will have to submit a warrant to Finger Lakes Library System because the system owns <u>all</u> Polaris records.

Other Tips for Patron Registration

- Try to get an email for notifications as it cuts down on paper notices.
- Include a full birthday, which is important for statistical and reporting purposes. It will not be shared.
- Choose the correct patron code.
- Your library may put special emphasis on PSTAT3 and the Local Use fields.
- Check with your library supervisor for other special procedures.

<u>WARNING:</u> Never include a Driver License number, EBT number, credit card number, Social Security number, or other sensitive personal information in the patron's record.

AWARDS & GRANTS

SCRLC Digitization Awards

South Central Regional Library Council's Board of Trustees is pleased to announce the 2025-2026 grant round for regional digitization projects. Funded projects will start after July 1, 2025 and conclude by June 30, 2026.

For 2025-2026, applications are especially encouraged for:

- partnerships increasing representation of and with communities that have been historically and systematically oppressed;
- geographically underrepresented communities in the SCRLC region;
- innovative approaches to availing digitized collections, e.g., holding or co-organizing a Wikipedia edit-a-thon to add links to New York Heritage collections, walking tours, virtual tours through ESIE, or HistoryForge participation.

All proposals received will be presented to a review panel comprised of expert individuals from outside the SCRLC region for evaluation and funding recommendations. Individual applications are limited to \$5,000; partnership applications, to \$8,000.
