FROM THE DIRECTOR

State Budget - The New York State budget is due on Tuesday, April 1. However, all indications show that the budget will most likely be late. One key factor that has cropped up over the last few weeks is that the Trump administration's push to cut federal funding will most likely impact the NY State budget. In jeopardy is roughly \$91 billion in federal money that NY State was expected to receive. Currently, annual budget negotiations do not account for reductions in federal aid.



Here is what is currently being discussed for library funding in NY:

- One house budgets for Senate and Assembly have been released:
 - Senate \$109.6M in Library Aid/\$54M Construction Aid
 - Assembly \$107.1M in Library Aid/\$68M Construction Aid
 - o Governor \$104.6M in Library Aid/\$34M Construction Aid
- School Library Materials Aid currently at \$6/student:
 - Senate proposed \$11.33/student
 - Assembly proposed \$11.50/student
- Senate, Assembly, and Governor want to continue funding NovelNY, which are databases used by NY residents.

You still have time to reach out to your State elected officials before the State budget is passed. Please consider making phone calls to both your Senators and Assemblymembers. You can use the NYLA email messaging service here. After you submit an email, it also gives you wording for making phone calls to your elected officials.

Federal Funding - On Friday, March 14, President Donald Trump signed <u>an executive</u> <u>order</u> regarding the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), and six other federal agencies.

The Executive Order states that the agencies' "non-statutory components and functions ... shall be eliminated to the maximum extent consistent with applicable law," and they should also "reduce the performance of their statutory functions and associated personnel to the minimum presence and function required by law." If you would like to know more about this, please read the *American Libraries* article that explains the IMLS situation in greater detail. <u>Just a reminder</u>: Finger Lakes Library System funding and member library funding is NOT from federal funding except for very small instances, such as E-rate which helps with internet costs, and grant opportunities. Finger Lakes Library System is primarily funded by NY State funding which is provided through our State legislature and is currently safe. Your member library funding is currently safe.

Please expect updates from FLLS on both State funding and federal funding/IMLS as we receive them.

Menstrual Literacy and Advocacy in Libraries (OWWL)

Rooting out Dysfunction and Creating Successful Teams (RRLC/ESLN)


Wednesday, May 14 | 2:00-3:00pm | FREE


TECH TIP

To View Issues in a Specific Collection in Polaris


- 1. Open an item record search. On the taskbar, click on Cataloging → Item Records.
- 2. Click on (None) in the Limit by box and select Assigned Branch. Click to select your library in the Value box. Put * in the For field.



Click on the Collections tab. Click on Unselect All. Check the box next the desired collection, ex. [AF] Adult Fiction. Click on Search.



4. Hit **Ctrl Shift A** on your keyboard to retrieve all results. You may have to increase the Retrieval Limit on the **Settings Tab if** your collection contains over 1000 items. Click on the **Call Number**, **Volume Number**, **Collection**, or **Shelf Location** headings to sort the items. Try sorting multiple ways. Scroll through and visually scan the items. Double click on an item to open the record and fix any disparities, i.e. the call number and collection don't match, volume number is incorrect, etc.

AWARDS & GRANTS

SCRLC Digitization Awards

Deadline: April 11, 2025

For 2025-2026, applications are especially encouraged for:

- partnerships increasing representation of and with communities that have been historically and systematically oppressed;
- geographically underrepresented communities in the SCRLC region;
- innovative approaches to availing digitized collections, e.g., holding or coorganizing a Wikipedia edit-a-thon to add links to New York Heritage collections, walking tours, virtual tours through ESIE, or HistoryForge participation.

All proposals received will be presented to a review panel comprised of expert individuals from outside the SCRLC region for evaluation and funding recommendations. Individual applications are limited to \$5,000; partnership applications, to \$8,000.

First Book National Book Bank Offers Free Books for Children Deadline: Ongoing

<u>First Book</u> is a nonprofit dedicated to educational equity, providing free and affordable books to children in under-resourced communities. The First Book Marketplace offers new books at low or no cost, thanks to donations from publishers and vendors. Eligible nonprofits and schools serving at least 70% low-income children, such as Title I schools, early childhood programs, literacy programs, or afterschool programs, can order books for just the cost of shipping and processing.

Sign up at <u>www.fbmarketplace.org/register</u>; new members receive a \$25 welcome code for their first order. Becoming a First Book member takes about 5 minutes, and includes access to special funding opportunities made available from donors and partners.

If your library has an E-rate of 90, if you have specific programming for students with disabilities, and/or if you work in a Title I-eligible school library (or in a public library that serves 70% or more kids and families from Title I-eligible schools nearby), then you are automatically eligible to sign up with First Book.
